

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN (PPP) FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT PROCESS FOR THE PROPOSED MINING OF QUARRIES 4,5,6A, & 6B ASSOCIATED WITH THE UPGRADE OF NATIONAL ROAD R573 (MOLOTO ROAD), GAUTENG PROVINCE

### **JUNE 2020**

This plan has been submitted as per the requirements of the General Provisions of Annexure 2 of the Regulations issued in terms of Section 27(2) of the Disaster Management Act, 2002 (Act No.57 of 2002) and published on 29 April 2020 in Government Notice No R.480 of Government Gazette No 43258 and also in terms of the directions regarding the measures to address, prevent and combat the spread of the COVID-19 relating to the National Environmental Management Permits and Licences issued by the Minister of Environment, Forestry and Fisheries on 05 June 2020.

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

It is the intention of the South African National Roads Agency Soc Ltd to establish various Quarries to provide the necessary construction materials for the proposed upgrading of national road R573-1 (K139) from Baviaanspoort Road in Tshwane (km 0,00) to the Gauteng / Mpumalanga Provincial Border (± 46.00 km). The upgrading of the R573 Moloto Road includes the following projects:

- Upgrading of the entire length of the R573/1 Moloto Road to a 4-lane barrier-divided dual carriageway from Stormvoël Road to the Gauteng border;
- Construction of the southern link between Stormvoël Road and Baviaanspoort Road;
- Construction of the new PWV2 link between the N1/N4 Interchange and the R573/1 Moloto Road;
- Construction of the Moloto/Sefako Makgatho Interchange;
- Construction of the Big Tree Mall Interchange;
- Construction of the De Wagendrift bypass along the R573/1; and
- Various upgrades to local roads and upgrading of intersections to small interchanges (Moepel Overpass; Baviaanspoort Road East extension; Dewar, Sakabuka and Maroela interchanges and road developments).

The SANRAL appointed KBK Engineers to provide engineering services for the proposed development. KBK Engineers appointed GA Environment (Pty) Ltd on behalf of SANRAL as independent Environmental Consultants to undertake the required Environmental approvals for the mining of four Quarries for the purpose of the proposed development. All four Quarries are situated along the R573 Moloto Road and are as follows:

- Quarry 6A;
- Quarry 6B;
- Quarry 4 and
- Quarry 5.

It is important to note that a Basic Assessment Process will be undertaken for Quarry 4 & Quarry 5 and a Scoping and EIA process will be undertaken for Quarry 6A and 6B. Four separate Environmental Authorisation applications and reports will be compiled for each site and submitted to the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy (DMRE). However, the Public Participation Plan (PPP) is applicable to all four Quarries as they all fall along the R573.

A pre-application meeting was undertaken on the 24<sup>th</sup> of January 2020 with the DMRE officials, Mr Nkosinathi Mahlaba, Mr Ntsundeni Ravhugoni, and Mr Muse Mangobe to discuss the application process and the DMRE's requirements.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> of June 2020, the minister issued directions regarding the measures to address, prevent and combat the spread of the COVID-19 relating to the National Environmental Management Permits and Licences. One of the requirements provided in the directions is that a Public Participation Plan shall be submitted to the DMRE, in instances where a case officer has been assigned to the project then the Public Participation Plan shall be submitted to the case officer.

According to Section (2)(4)(f) of the National Environmental Management Act, the participation of all Interested and Affected Parties (I&APs) must be promoted and all potential I&APs must be informed early and in an informative and proactive way regarding applications that may affect their lives or livelihood. In order to give effect to the above sections, it is essential to ensure that there is adequate and appropriate opportunity for Public Participation (PP) in decisions that may affect the environment.

The purpose of this document is to provide the competent authority with direction on the Public Participation processes to be fulfilled while ensuring that the Environmental Assessment Practitioner's (EAPs) actions curtail the threat posed by the Covid-19 pandemic and to alleviate, contain and minimise the effects of the national state of disaster. It is the intention of GA Environment to ensure that reasonable opportunity is provided for public participation and that all administrative actions are reasonable. While the challenges posed by COVID-19 pandemic are drastic, the specific measures recommended have been carefully considered to ensure that the process is transparent and participatory to all I&APs.

The NEMA EIA Regulations, 2014 (as amended) prescribe the minimum requirements for Public Participation as summarised in Table 1. Due to the COVID 19 pandemic and in line with the section 27(2) of the Disaster Management Act, additional measures have been proposed in this PP Plan. The level of Public Participation required for the proposed projects has been informed by:

- the scale of anticipated impacts of the proposed project;
- the sensitivity of the affected environment and the community interest in the matters related to the project; and
- the characteristics of the potentially affected parties.

### 2. LEGISLATIVE REQUIREMENTS

Chapter 6 of the NEMA EIA Regulations 2014, as amended (Government Notice R. 982 in Government Gazette No. 40772 of 07 April 2017) prescribes the minimum requirements for Public Participation through which all role players including potential I&APs, state departments, organs of state, and the competent authority (CA) to obtain clear, accurate and understandable information about the environmental impacts of the proposed activity or implications of a decision. These requirements and the sections of the report in which they have been addressed is provided in **Table 1.**
